Xu Bing believes the Chinese character “一” (meaning “one” or a stroke in Chinese calligraphy) is the beginning of all things.

In *The Character of Characters*, Xu Bing explores the origins of writing and the connection between Chinese calligraphy, the role of replication in art and society, and the impacts they have on our lives.

The animation is based on a famous painting known as *Autumn Colors on the Qiao and Hua Mountains* by 13th century artist Zhao Mengfu. In *The Character of Characters*, Xu Bing brings this painting into an animated land where traditional objects and modern icons meet.
